






MAZATLÁN, a city of 25,000, has good fishing throughout year. When weather is too hot for the "gringos," natives go out anyway, not for sport but for food.



BIG FISH MAKES A SPECTACULAR JUMP






DANCING MADLY ON ITS TAIL, ANGRY FISH FLARES SAIL AND TRIES TO SHAKE OUT HOOK

Although the fishing itself is superb, there are other factors which help account for Mazatlán's increasing popularity with U.S. fisher-men. Unlike the plush resorts of Acapulco and Guaymas, Mazatlán lies off the main transportation routes and there are relatively few tourists cluttering up the town. Consequently the prices are remarkably low. A night in one of Mazatlán's two hotels costs the U.S. equivalent of 75¢. A fishing boat, complete with bait, tackle

and a four-man crew, costs only \$3.49 per hour.
Recently Life Photographer Peter Stackpole went down to Mazatlán to spend a fishing weekend with a dozen businessmen from
California. In the three fin-filled days that followed, a few of the whoppers got away. But when
the weary and sunburned fishermen boarded
their place for the give hear fights health. their plane for the six-hour flight back home, they had an abundance of fish-story material. Their total catch: 24 sailfish and one marlin, almost all of them weighing well over 100 pounds.






